Five Factor Model (FFM)

- ▶ Extraversion [E]
- ▶ Agreeableness [A]
- ▶ Conscientiousness [C]
- ▶ Neuroticism [N]
- ▶ Openness [O]

“...a robust and widely accepted framework for conceptualizing the structure of personality... Although the FFM is not universally accepted in the field...”^[1]
